



NATIONAL OPIOID SETTLEMENTS

- The national opioid settlements resulted from lawsuit negotiations, requiring opioid manufacturers and distributors to pay back more than \$50 billion over a period of 18 years to the American people through state and local governments
- Harnett County will receive upwards of \$11,000,000
 distributed over 18 years, from Fiscal Year 2022-23 through
 Fiscal Year 2038-39, through a Memorandum of
 Agreement with North Carolina
- \$215,000 has been allocated to the Medication-Assisted
 Treatment/Medications for Opioid Use Disorder
 (MAT/MOUD) program in the Harnett County Detention Center
- \$20,000 has been allocated to the purchase of Narcan for community distribution, including the School System





- Apr 2022: North Carolina Attorney General finalized the Memorandum between North Carolina and Harnett County
- Summer 2022: Senior Staff Attorney received settlement documents & discussed with Deputy County Manager
- Summer 2022: began engaging stakeholders including:

 - Sheriff's Office
 Campbell University Faculty
 - EMS

- Various community members
- September 12, 2022: first Opioid Task Force meeting
- October 20, 2022: Opioid Task Force meeting
- December 2022: Reaching Rural Initiative kick-off & monthly meetings with coaches began














FORMATION OF CORE LEADERSHIP TEAM

- Our team was strategically chosen, comprising a vast array of representation across the county
- The Reaching Rural Initiative was the catalyst for building a strong leadership team to pull together our Opioid Task Force, create a strategic plan, and build momentum
- Including a K-12 school system representative on our team formed a crucial partnership






The Current State of the Opioid Problem in Harnett County

• June 2023: NCACC Summit on Reducing Overdose







EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

- The Executive Committee reviews
 funding proposals from subcommittees
- If Executive Committee votes to approve a funding proposal, it must then go before the Opioid Task Force for a vote
- If the Opioid Task Force approves, the Executive Committee shall propose the project to the Harnett County Commissioners for formal approval

- February 2024: monthly subcommittee meetings began
- March 7, 2024: Recovering Hope Conference
- April 11, 2024: Executive Committee reviewed and unanimously approved naloxone funding proposal
- April 18, 2024: Opioid Task Force reviewed and unanimously approved naloxone funding proposal
- May 1, 2024: jail launched Phase II of MAT/MOUD
- May 6, 2024: County Commissioners adopted resolution to allocate \$20,000 settlement funds to community-based naloxone distribution
- May 6, 2024: County Commissioners voted to accept \$98,000 in Reaching Rural grant to fund Jail Re-entry Navigator
- May 7, 2024: community Narcan training provided by Health Department staff at Another Barbershop in Dunn

- June 3, 2024: launched website, presented to County Commissioners and Harnett County School Board
- **July 1, 2024:** Health Department's Naloxone Distribution Policy effective
- **July 11, 2024:** Recovery Alive proposal tabled by Executive Committee
- July 18, 2024: Opioid Task Force meeting
- July 19, 2024: visit to Recovery Alive houses in Smithfield, North Carolina
- July 24, 2024: met with Judge Wood who is assigned to Veterans Treatment Court (VTC), District Attorney, and Director of VTC





MAIN ACCOMPLISHMENTS TO DATE

1

Prevent harmful substance use

- Harnett County Schools hired Clinical Social Worker to serve students
- Campbell University and local faith leaders led Recovering Hope Conference
- Continued collaboration with community- and faith-based organizations

2

Support treatment and recovery

- Sheriff's Office initiated Phase I of MAT/MOUD in jail (continuation of MAT/MOUD for existing patients)
- Sheriff's Office hired Jail Re-entry Navigator to provide critical support (\$215,000 settlement funding)
- Sheriff's Office initiated Phase II of MAT/MOUD in jail (inducting new patients onto MAT/MOUD treatment)
- Community Paramedicine program continues to expand to support individuals navigating substance use disorder

Reduce harm

3

- Harnett County Health Department distributes free naloxone to individuals and has policy allowing community organizations to receive naloxone in bulk for community-based distribution
- Harnett County Schools has equipped each campus with Narcan
- Harnett County Schools has trained over 100 staff members to administer Narcan and continues to train more
- Harnett County Schools is preparing to launch pilot program for Narcan kits on school buses
- Alliance Health (LME-MCO) has gifted free naloxone to the Health Department for distribution

CURRENT INITIATIVES

- Launching community-based naloxone distribution (new policy)
- Alliance Health (LME-MCO) + NC Harm Reduction Coalition
- Coordinating Peer Support services with Southlight
- By the beginning of the 2024–25 school year, Harnett County Schools intend to...
 - Train all HCS staff members to administer Narcan
 - Launch pilot program for Narcan kits on all school buses
- Collaborating with community members to support a parent advocacy group
- Expanding Post-Overdose Response Team
- Increasing publicity of OTF and promoting education
- Exploring Recovery Alive Housing
