

# DEATHS BY OVERDOSE IN HARNETT COUNTY, NC



Harnett County's **overdose death rate** has increased **more than tenfold** since 2000. Per 100,000 people, the overdose death rate rose from **4.4 in 2000** to **52.2 in 2021**.

## NATIONAL OPIOID SETTLEMENTS

- Upwards of 3,000 state and local governments targeted opioid manufacturers and distributors in a ground-breaking class action lawsuit
- The national opioid settlements resulted from these negotiations, requiring opioid manufacturers and distributors to pay back more than \$50 billion over a period of 18 years to the American people through state and local governments
- The settlement dollars were divided up between all 50 states based on how much they have been impacted by the **opioid use epidemic**
- Through a Memorandum of Agreement with North Carolina, Harnett County will receive over \$11,000,000 over the 18-year period, starting in the summer of 2022
- Harnett County staff and many local community members spent the first year building an Opioid Task
   Force and creating a Strategic Plan to ensure effective and sustainable use of funds

#### WHAT ARE OPIOIDS?

- Opioids are a class of drug often prescribed for pain management, which can be very effective when used as directed by a medical professional
- Opioids may create a **euphoric feeling** when used—therefore, they are **sold illegally** on the black market
- Regular use of opioids, even as prescribed by a medical professional, may build tolerance which may lead to dependence
- Misuse of opioids, including street drugs that may contain a mix of opioids and other substances, can lead to addiction, overdose, and death

#### **EXAMPLES OF OPIOIDS**

- Heroin
- Morphine (Kadian®, Avinza®)
- Codeine
- Oxymorphone (Opana®)
- Fentanyl
- Hydromorphone (Dilaudid®)
- Tramadol
- Hydrocodone (Vicodin®)
- Oxycodone (OxyContin®, Percocet®)

# SYMPTOMS OF OPIOID OVERDOSE

# CALL 911 IMMEDIATELY IF A PERSON EXHIBITS ANY OF THESE SYMPTOMS:

- Appears dizzy, confused, or losing consciousness
- Body goes limp
- Unresponsive to voice or touch
- Unable to speak
- Breathing is slow or weak
- Heartbeat is slow or erratic
- Making choking or gurgling sounds
- Vomiting or frothing at the mouth
- Fingertips or fingernails appear blue or purple
- Lips appear blue or purple
- Skin is pale, cold, or clammy to the touch
- Pinpoint-sized pupils

# USING NARCAN® NASAL SPRAY

## CALL 911 IMMEDIATELY



#### Step 1: CHECK if you suspect an overdose:

- <u>CHECK</u> for a <u>suspected overdose</u>: the person will not wake up or is very sleepy or not breathing well
  - yell "Wake up!"
  - · shake the person gently
  - · if the person is not awake, go to Step 2



#### Step 2: Give 1st dose in the nose

- HOLD the nasal spray device with your thumb on the bottom of the plunger
- INSERT the nozzle into either NOSTRIL
- PRESS the plunger firmly to give the 1st dose
- 1 nasal spray device contains 1 dose




#### Step 3: Call 911

CALL 911 immediately after giving the 1st dose



# USING NARCAN® NASAL SPRAY

### CALL 911 IMMEDIATELY



#### Step 4: WATCH & GIVE

- WAIT 2-3 minutes after the 1<sup>st</sup> dose to give the medicine time to work
- if the person wakes up: Go to Step 5
- · if the person does not wake up:
  - CONTINUE TO GIVE doses every 2-3 minutes until the person wakes up
  - · it is safe to keep giving doses



#### Step 5: STAY

- STAY until ambulance arrives: even if the person wakes up
- GIVE another dose if the person becomes very sleepy again
- · You may need to give all the doses in the pack

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
# USING NARCAN® NASAL SPRAY

## CALL 911 IMMEDIATELY

- Narcan® should be stored at room temperature (36° F to 77° F) — protect product from excessive heat, cold, or light
- For use in the nose only
- DO NOT prime or test nasal spray
- One nasal spray device contains one dose of medicine
- Each device sprays one time only
- After administering Narcan®, expect the individual to experience the following symptoms when they wake up:
  - Shaking
  - Sweating
  - Nausea
  - Feeling angry

### RECOVERY POSITION

AFTER administering Narcan®, move the person into recovery position to keep their airway clear

## Should I administer Narcan® if I'm not sure what they took?

YES! Narcan® will have no noticeable effects on someone without opioids in their system.

> STREET DRUGS MAY INCLUDE A MIXTURE OF OPIOIDS AND NON-OPIOIDS

Can Narcan® reverse <u>all</u> overdoses?

NO. Narcan® will not reverse overdoses from **non-opioid** substances, such as:

- Cocaine
   Benzodiazepines (benzos)
- Alcohol
- Xylazine (tranq)

#### What is Naloxone?

Naloxone is an FDA-approved medication designed to rapidly reverse an overdose by restoring breathing that may be administered intramuscularly, intranasally, or intravenously

#### What is Narcan®?

Narcan® is the brand name of a very common naloxone product; sold over the counter in the form of nasal spray

Even if you are unsure what they took...

IF SOMEONE IS UNONSCIOUS AND YOU HAVE NALOXONE, <u>USE IT.</u>

You might save a life.

## NORTH CAROLINA'S GOOD SAMARITAN LAW

Under North Carolina's Good Samaritan Law, you **may not be prosecuted** for certain drug offenses if:

- 1
- You seek medical assistance for a person experiencing a drug-related overdose by contacting the 911 system, a law enforcement officer, or EMS personnel.
- You believe that you are the **first person to seek medical assistance** for the overdose victim.
- You **provide your name** to the 911 system or to a law enforcement officer upon arrival.
- Law enforcement officers were not already at your location executing an arrest warrant, search warrant, or other lawful search.

Any **evidence** for prosecution of a drug-related offense obtained by a law enforcement authorities **was obtained because you sought medical assistance** for a drug-related overdose.

## NORTH CAROLINA'S NALOXONE ACCESS LAW

In North Carolina, you are **protected from a lawsuit** for administering naloxone **if you**:

1

In good faith, think the person is experiencing a drug overdose

2

Use **reasonable care** to administer the naloxone

These laws are in place to encourage the use of naloxone in uncertain situations with the intention of saving more lives.
